Personal responsibility, respect, a genuine partnership between the student, family and the college and a desire to restore relationships are fundamental components of the College's welfare and student management system.

The College does not use, or support the use of, any disciplinary action that demeans, humiliates or physically harms a student including corporal punishment.

The Student Management framework at EAC is underpinned by the following rights and responsibilities.

- The right of all staff, student, parents and visitors to be treated with dignity and respect.
- The right of students to learn through a range of learning styles and teaching practices.
- The right of all staff, student, parents and visitors to be free form harassment, physical abuse, emotional abuse and verbal abuse.
- The right of all staff, student, parents and visitors to be to be communicated with clearly, politely and respectfully.
- The right of all students to feel secure in an environment free from negative actions from others and form harmful substances and objects
- The right of all students to study, work and pursue activities in pleasant, well kept surroundings.
- The right of staff to pursue their work unhindered by disorder or disrespect.
- The right of staff to find fulfillment in their vocation.
- The right of students to feel proud of their College uniform.
- The right of students to solve their own problems when appropriate and manage their own behaviour.
- The right of students to understand and have prior knowledge of the consequences of inappropriate behaviour.
- The right of students to have their personal belongings treated with care.

From these rights come a set of responsibilities with respect to:

- Learning and work ethic
- Appropriate classroom behavior
- Appropriate out of class behavior
- Positive Interaction with all members of the College Community
- · Uniform and grooming
- Property
- Appropriate use of the internet, email and mobile phones
- Smoking, alcohol and illegal drugs
- Consideration for the ethos and values of EAC

The following particular behaviours are unacceptable:

- Respect and contempt for the ethos and values of Emmanuel Anglican College
- Disregard for uniform expectations
- Disruptive behaviors which affect the learning of others and the ability of the teacher to teach effectively
- Dropping of litter
- Use of obscene or offensive language, or images designed to offend
- Noisy and boisterous behaviour at an inappropriate time

- Harassment, intimidation and bullying
- Truancy or out of bounds
- The throwing of any object unless part of a sanctioned activity
- Spitting and chewing gum
- Graffiti and vandalism
- Deliberate damage to property, facilities and others' belongings

Possession of dangerous and/or restricted items

- · Possession, distribution and use of alcohol, cigarettes and illegal drugs.
- Unlawful behaviour
- Driving dangerously in and around the College grounds
- Inappropriate physical contact
- · Cheating in any context.

The following items are restricted and must not be brought to the College, except under extenuating circumstances and with the approval of the Principal:

- Large amounts of cash
- Aerosol spray cans
- Pocket knives, sheath knives or metal rulers
- Infra red hand controllers of any type
- Inappropriate magazines or comics
- Model guns or pistols
- Basketball cards or 'swap' cards of a similar nature

Classifying behaviours to apply appropriate consequences

LEVEL ONE (LOW)

Examples of minor incidents or instance (handled by classroom teacher or Pastoral Care Teacher)

(a) Misbehavior/Uncooperative Behaviour

- Failure to have the Student Planner
- Failure to have the Student Planner signed
- Homework not complete
- Not bringing equipment and materials for class
- Lateness for class
- Chewing gum
- Minor uniform breaches, general untidiness, items of uniform missing
- Being in classrooms without permission
- Litter dropping: failure to clean up after self
- Throwing of objects unless during a sanctioned activity

(b) Respect

- Impolite and rude behaviour
- Indifference to a reasonable request
- Fooling about by pushing & shoving
- Consumption of food or drink in classrooms (except under specific teacher direction, e.g. Food Technology)

(c) Attention Seeking

- Talking at inappropriate times
- Disruptive behaviour
- Using inappropriate language
- Asking inappropriate questions

Consequences of Level 1
Misbehavior (handled by teacher or Pastoral Care Teacher)

Possible consequences:

- Brief problem solving discussion with students
- One-to-one discussion between students and teacher
- Signatures in the Student Planner, notes in the diary to parent
- Time out/withdrawal in classroom
- Lunch time detention (20 mins)
- Confiscating restricted items
- Setting of additional work
- Withdrawal of privileges
- Notification of student behaviour to Stage Coordinator
- Lunch time clean up (20 mins)
- Writing lines or College rules.

Classifying behaviours to apply appropriate consequences (cont)

LEVEL TWO

Examples of repeated or more serious misbehaviour (handled by Stage Coordinator)

- Failure to attend lunch detention or clean up
- Leaving the class without approval
- Any of the low level misbehaviours on a consistent basis that suggest a pattern of misbehaviour is developing:
 - ✓ persistently wearing the uniform poorly
 - ✓ consistently not doing homework
 - ✓ poor effort on a regular basis in class
 - ✓ regularly late to class
- Blatant disobedience, discourtesy or insolence
- Back-chatting
- Water fights
- Spitting
- Throwing of objects in the grounds or elsewhere that are likely to cause harm of damage (e.g. stones)
- Truancy form a lesson
- Damage to College property or equipment
- Misbehaviour causing a major disruption of learning
- Teasing, including personal, racist or sexist taunts
- Bullying
- Harassment
- Absence from proper place(e.g. assembly) during College time
- Breach of College rules when driving a vehicles
- Possession of (non dangerous) restricted items
- Cheating
- Misuse of fire equipment

Consequences of Level 2 misbehaviour

To be dealt with at the Stage Coordinator level after advice supplied by the teacher(s) concerned with the following possible consequences, amongst others

- Parent notification in the diary, telephone or by formal letter
- Parent interview with student
- Setting of additional work
- Student monitoring cards applied
- Lunch detention
- After school detention
- Isolation of Student
- Withdrawal of privilege
- Participation in a restorative process

Classifying behaviours to apply appropriate consequences (cont)

LEVEL THREE

Examples of repeated or more serious behavious (handled by Deputy Principal

(a) Serious Misconduct

- Vandalism
- Unacceptable moral behaviour involving:
 - * self exposure/abuse
 - * other persons (soliciting/sexual harassment; consorting acts)
- Possessing offensive material (pornography, illustrations)
- Obscene or offensive behaviour
- Offensive behaviour directed at a teacher
- Graffiti
- Serious instances of bullying and harassment

(b) Use/possession/sale/distribution of inappropriate items including:

- Dangerous items
- Alcohol;
- Prohibited drugs;
- Cigarettes;
- Actions which could endanger the health of self/others (e.g. glue sniffing)

(c) Unlawful behaviour such as:

Theft, assault. Illegal entry, possession, extortion, bomb hoaxes, uses
of dangerous weapons/harmful object, forgery, arson.

(d) Defiant non-compliance

- Persistent/willful disruption
- Gross insolence;
- Truancy;
- unwillingness to participate/cooperate in behaviour management strategies & plans;
- breach of negotiated management plan/probationary contract.

(e) Conduct Prejudicial to the good order, reputation and discipline of Emmanuel Anglican College

Verbal or physical harassment of any other person

 Inappropriate behaviour while representing the College away from the College including traveling to and from the College Consequences of Level 3 misbehaviour

To be dealt with at the Deputy Principal level after advice from the Stage Coordinator concerned with the following possible consequences amongst others

- Parent interview
- Behaviour Monitoring Sheet
- Behaviour contract applied
- After school detention
- Saturday morning detention
- Support services may be involved
- Police referral
- Participation in a restorative process
- Withdrawal of privilege
- Isolation from student body
- Suspension (In consultation with the Principal)
- Cancellation of enrolment (Principal only)
